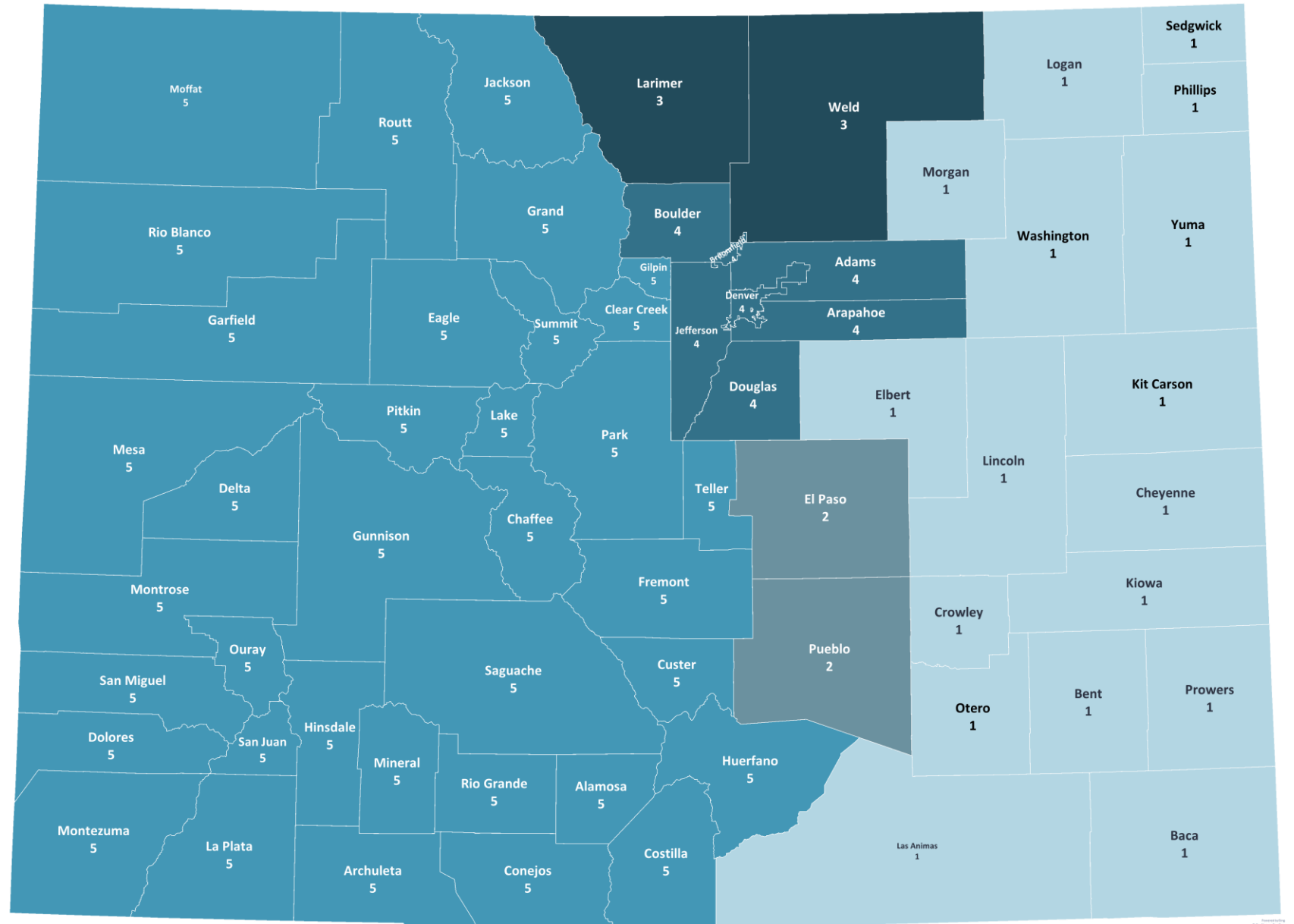

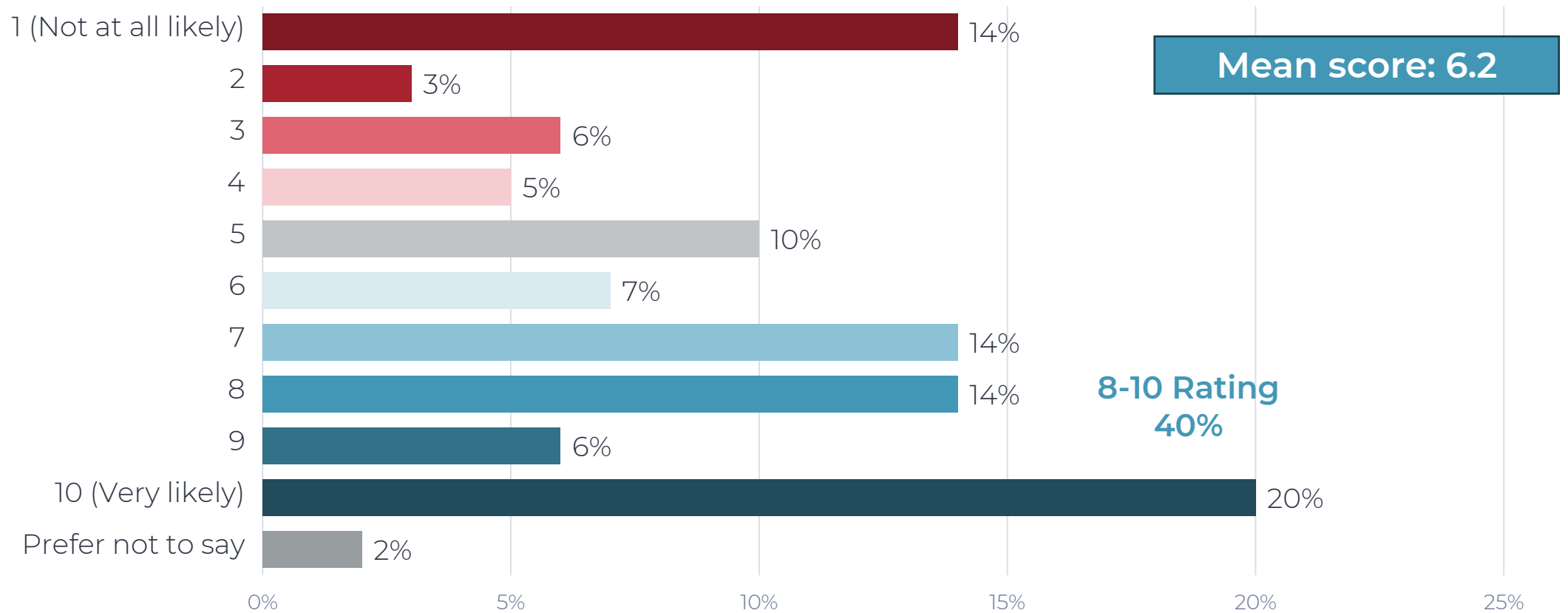




Top Concerns in Colorado

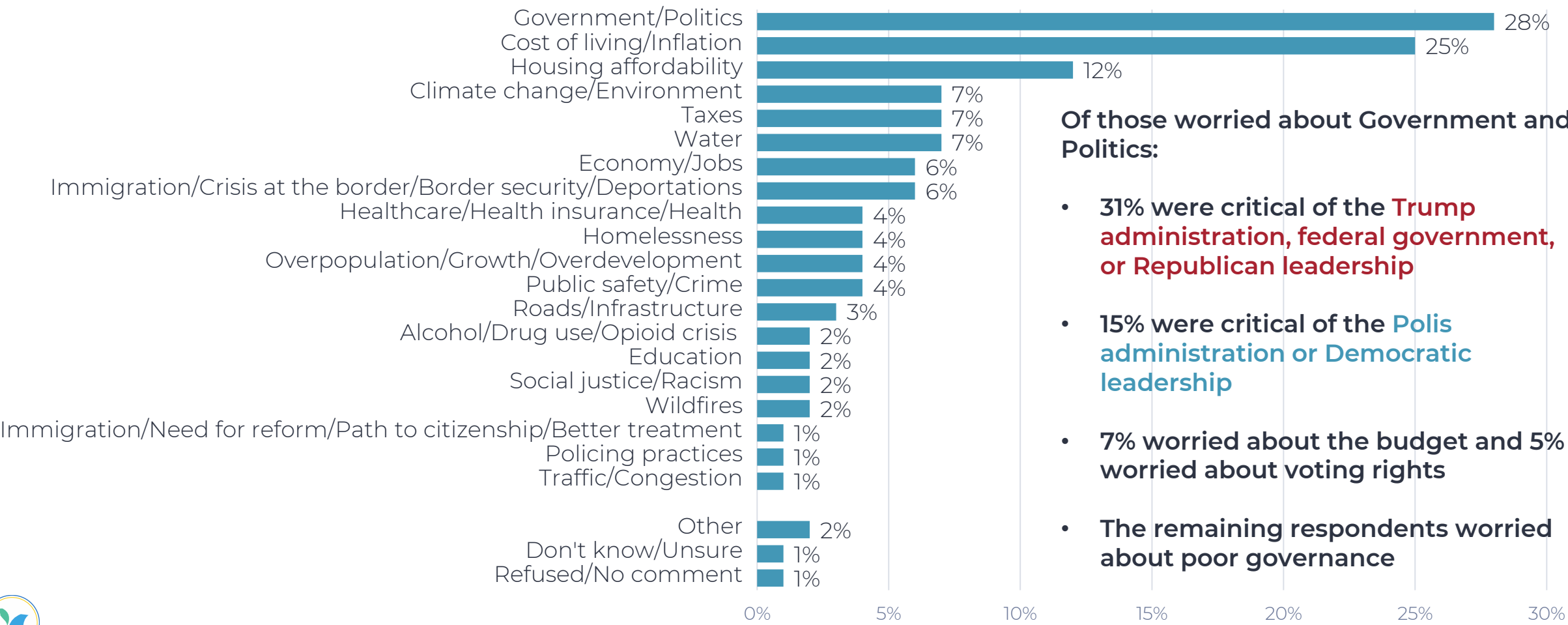

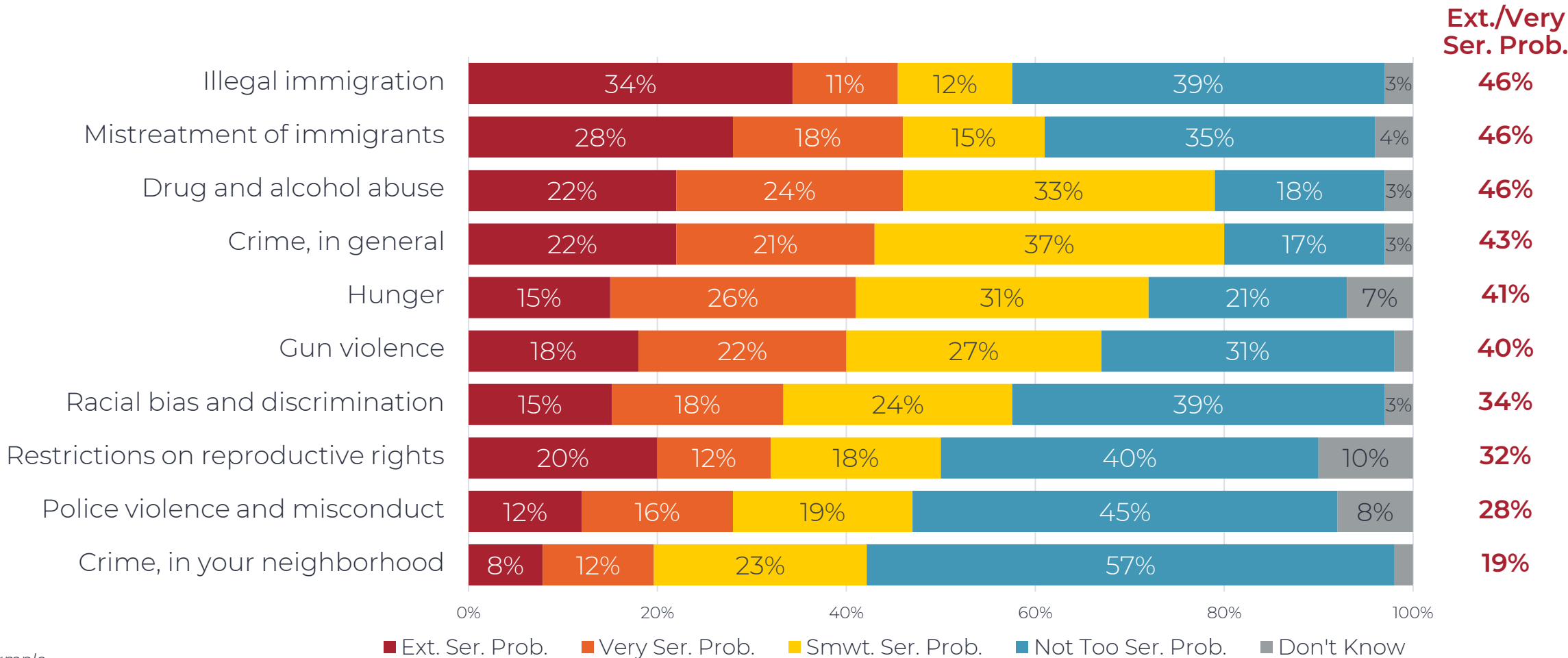

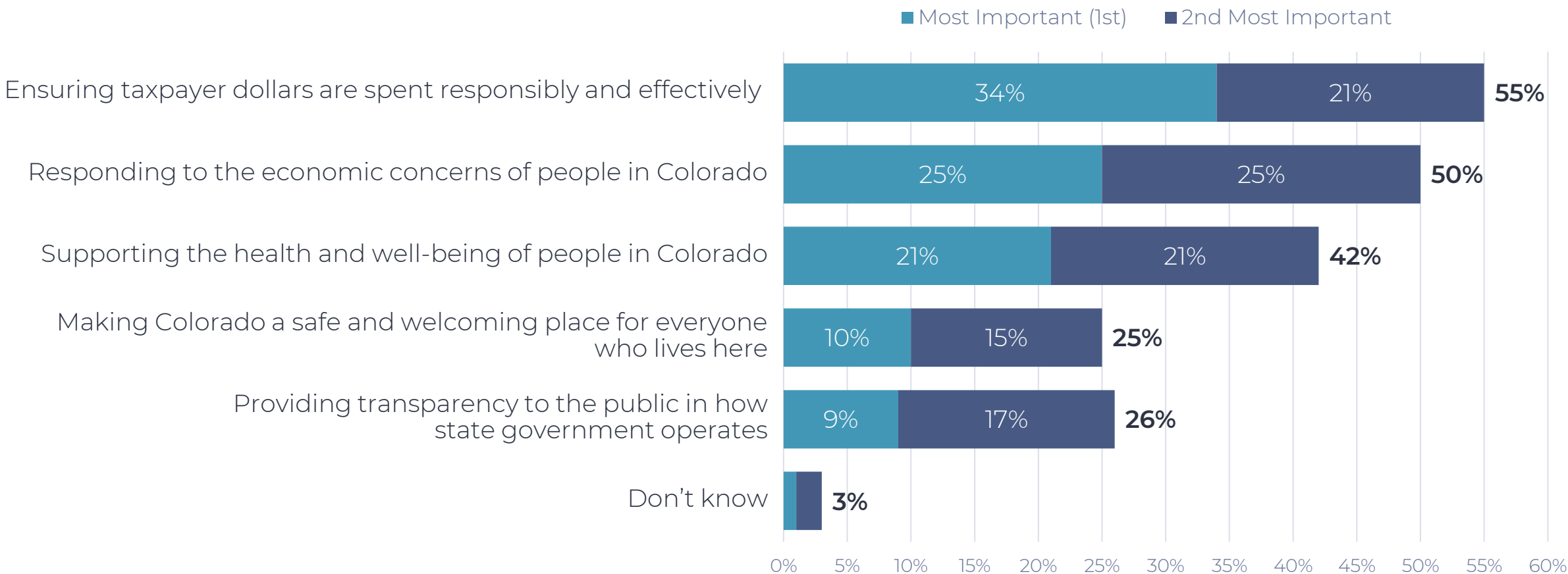

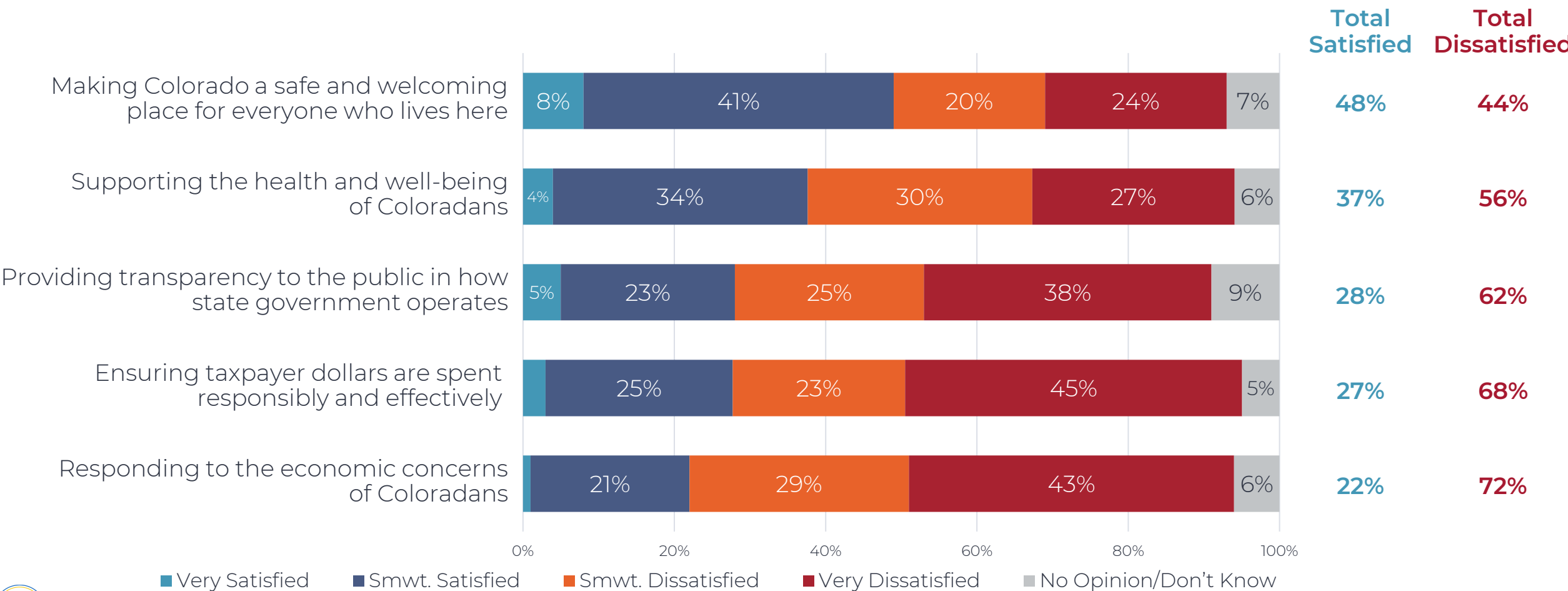

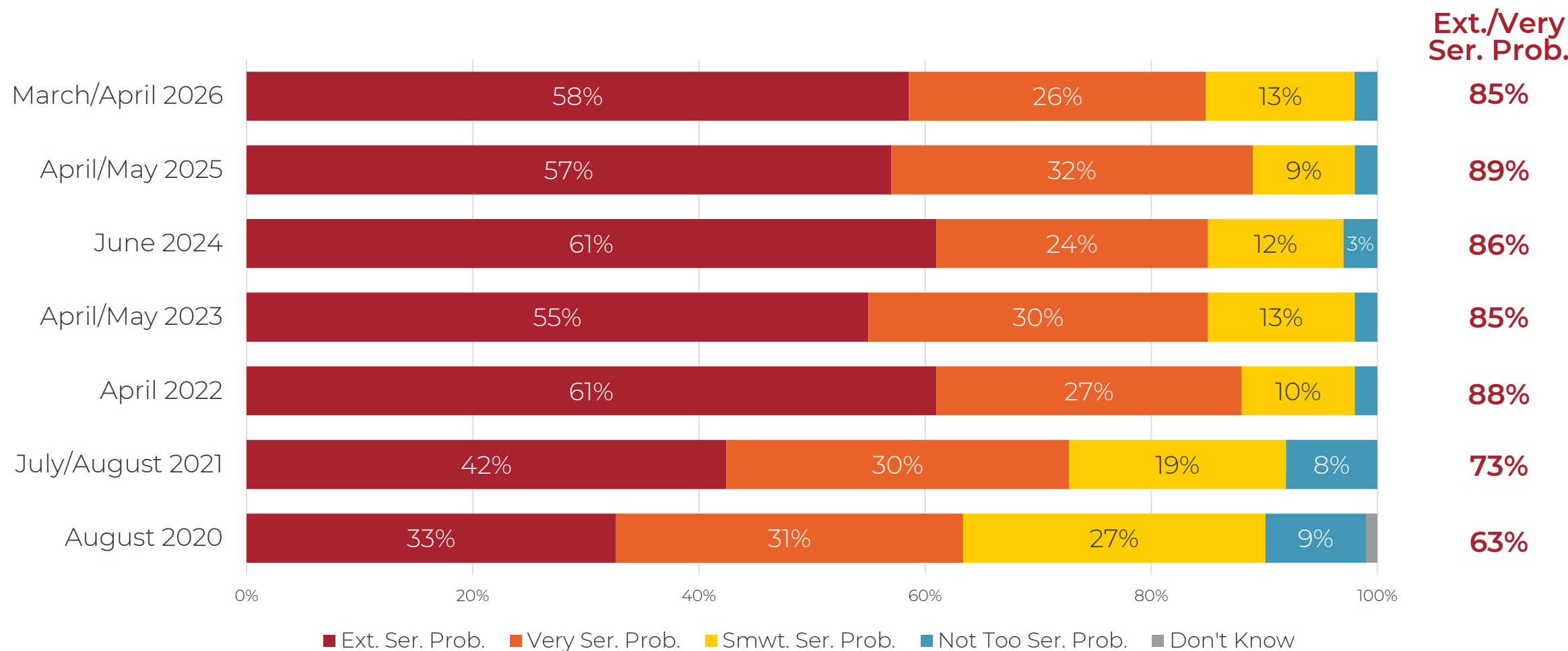

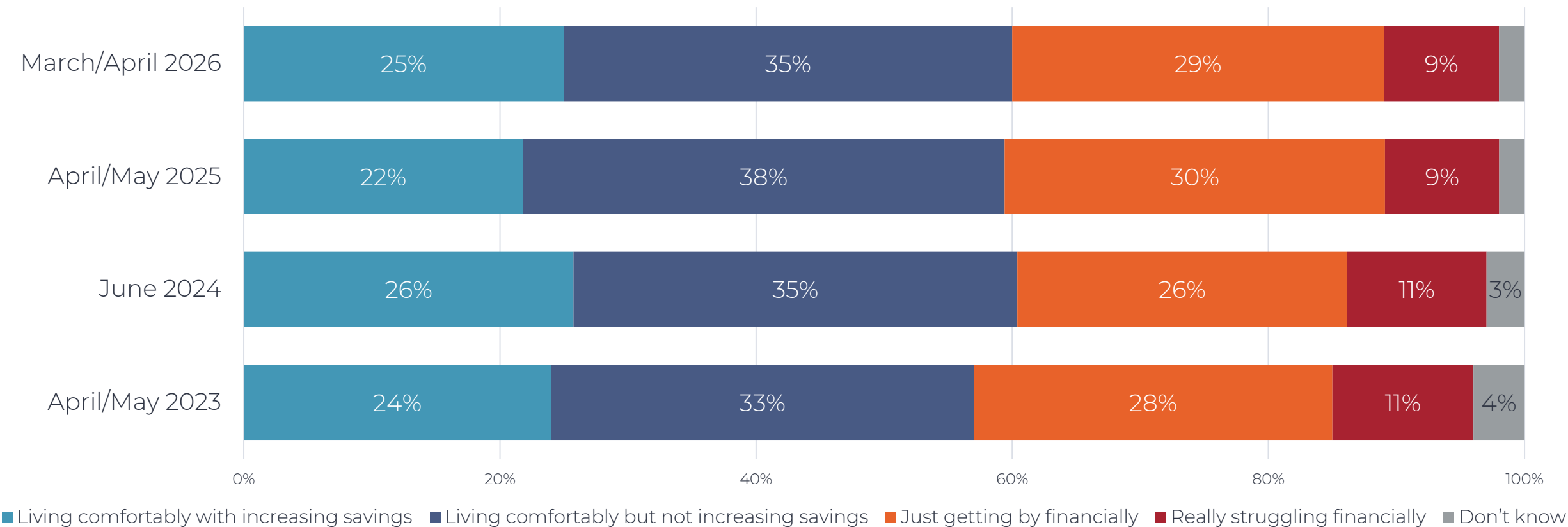

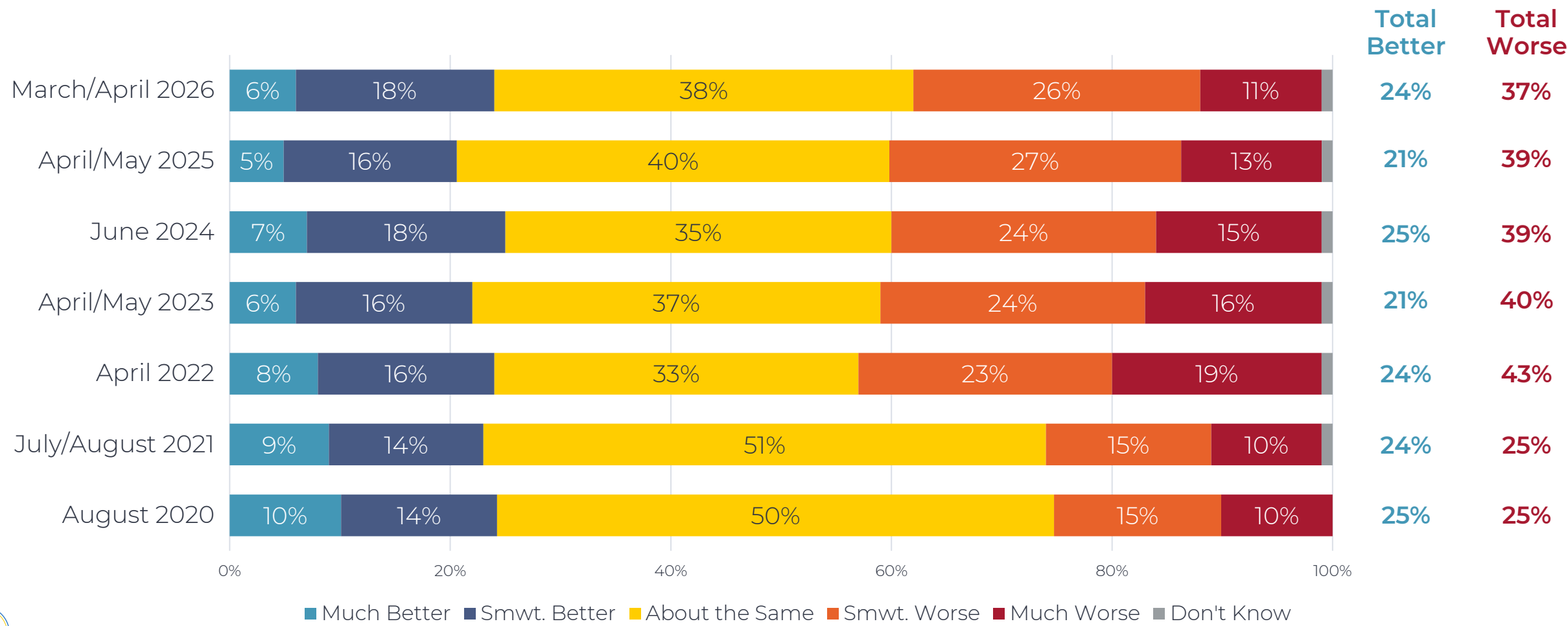

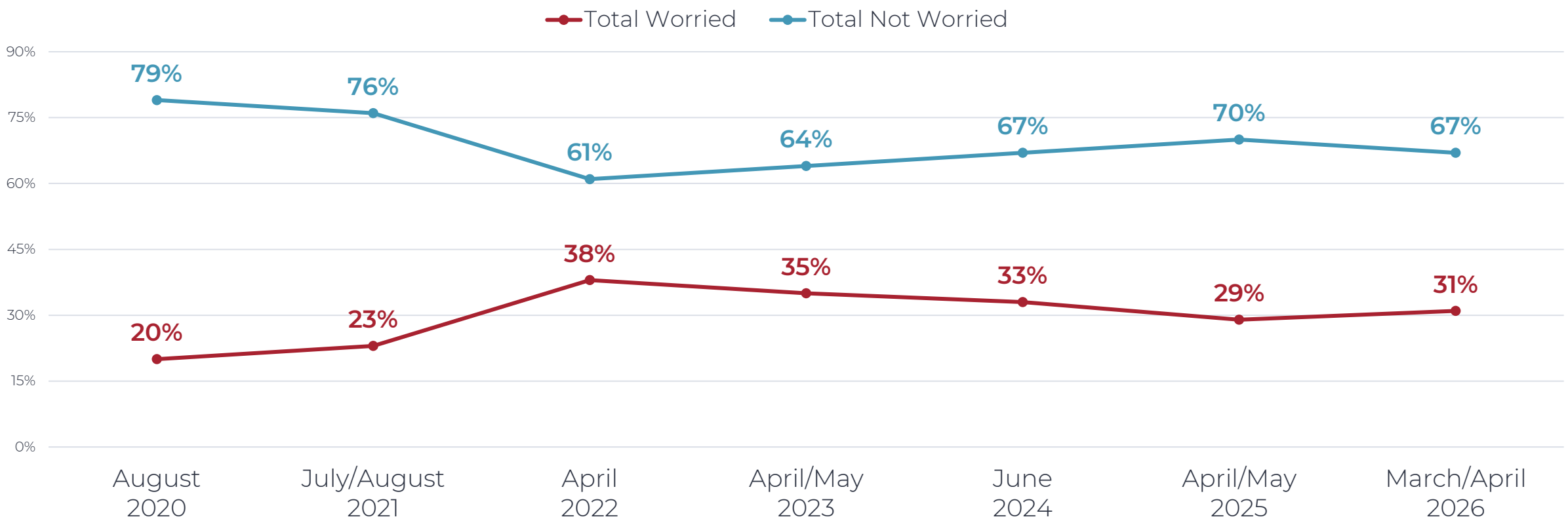

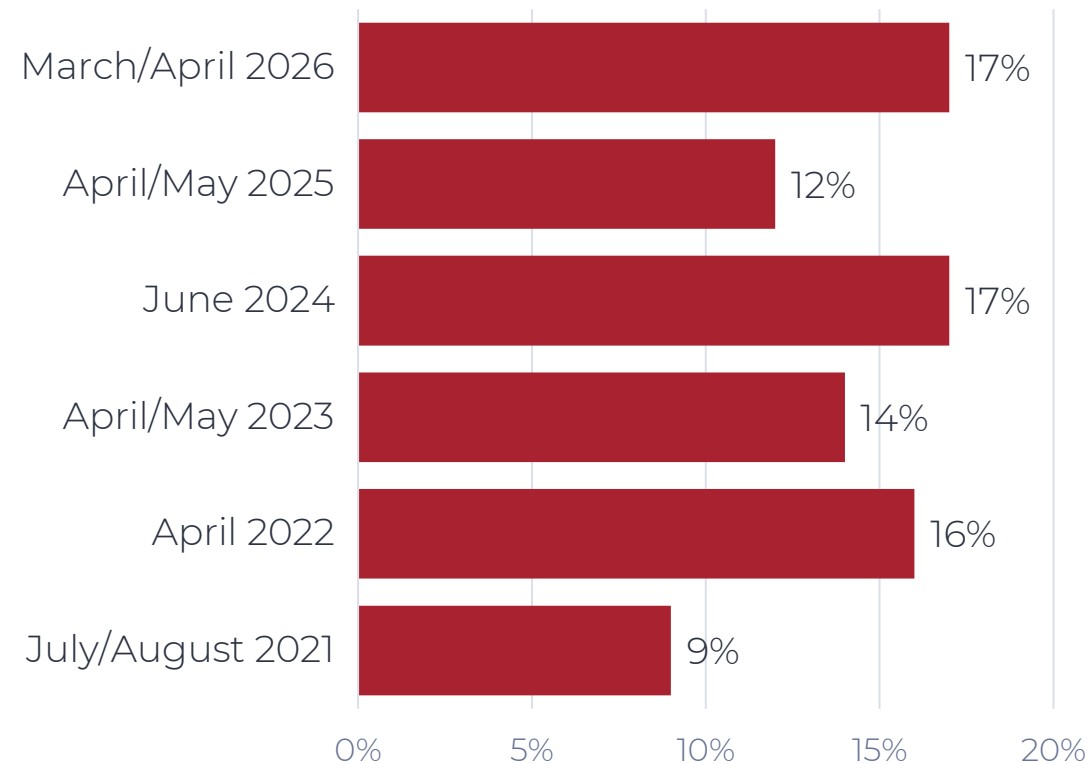

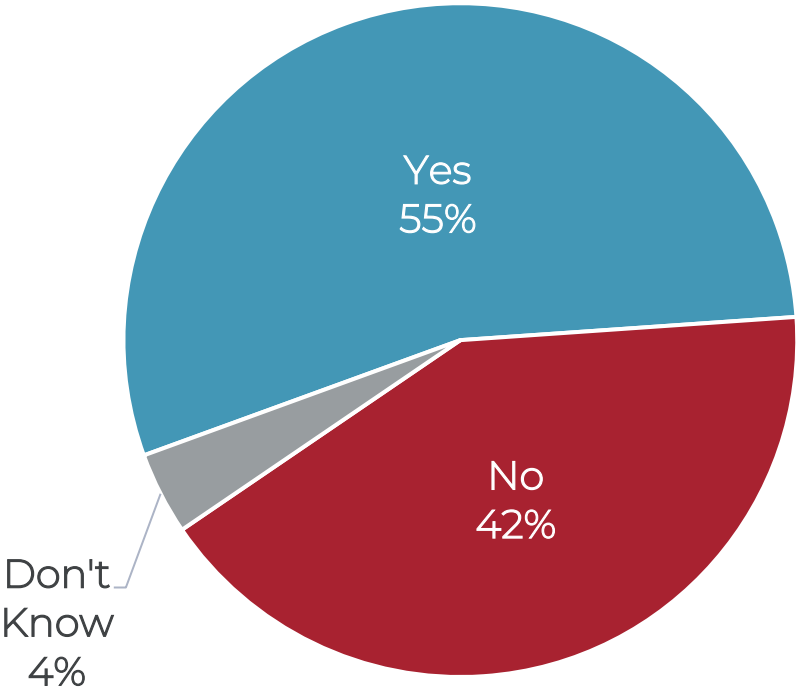

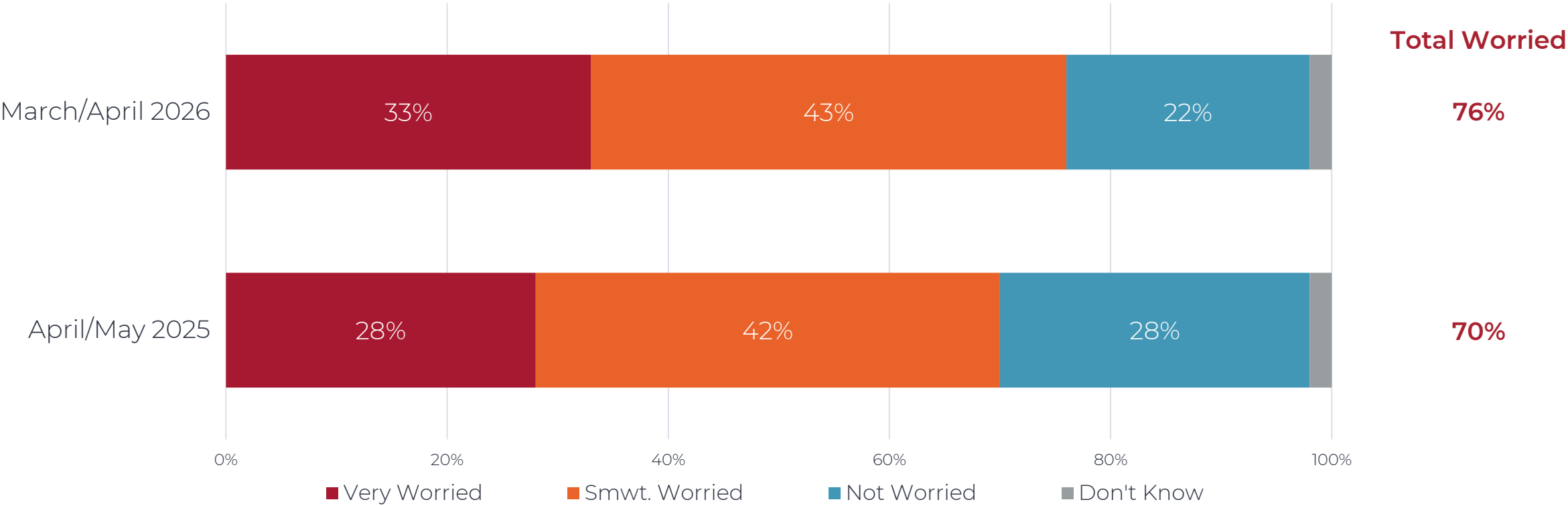

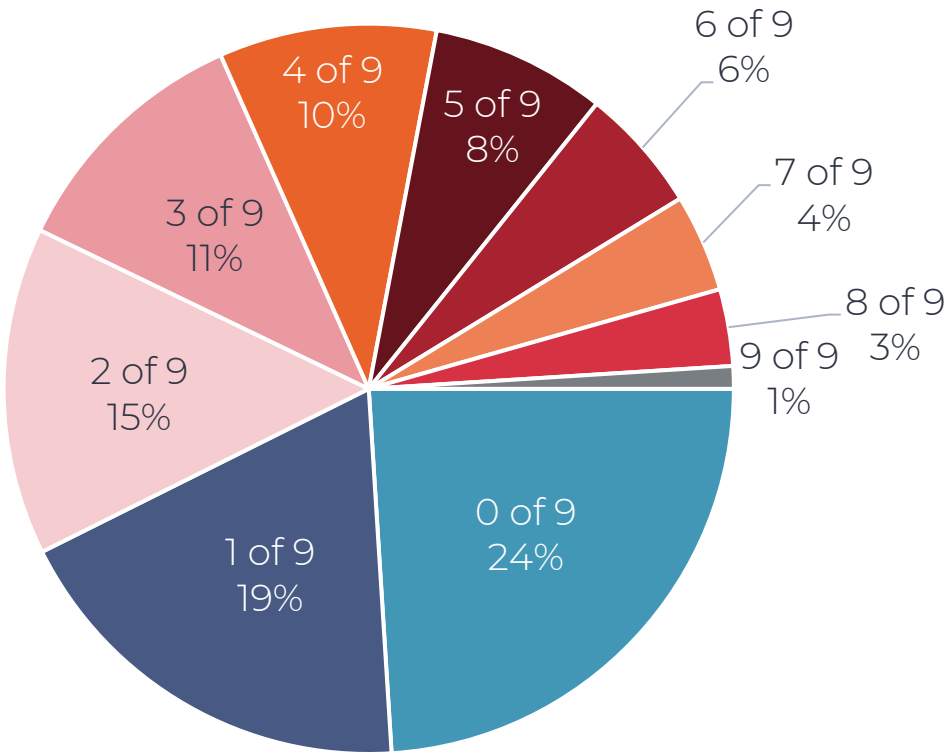

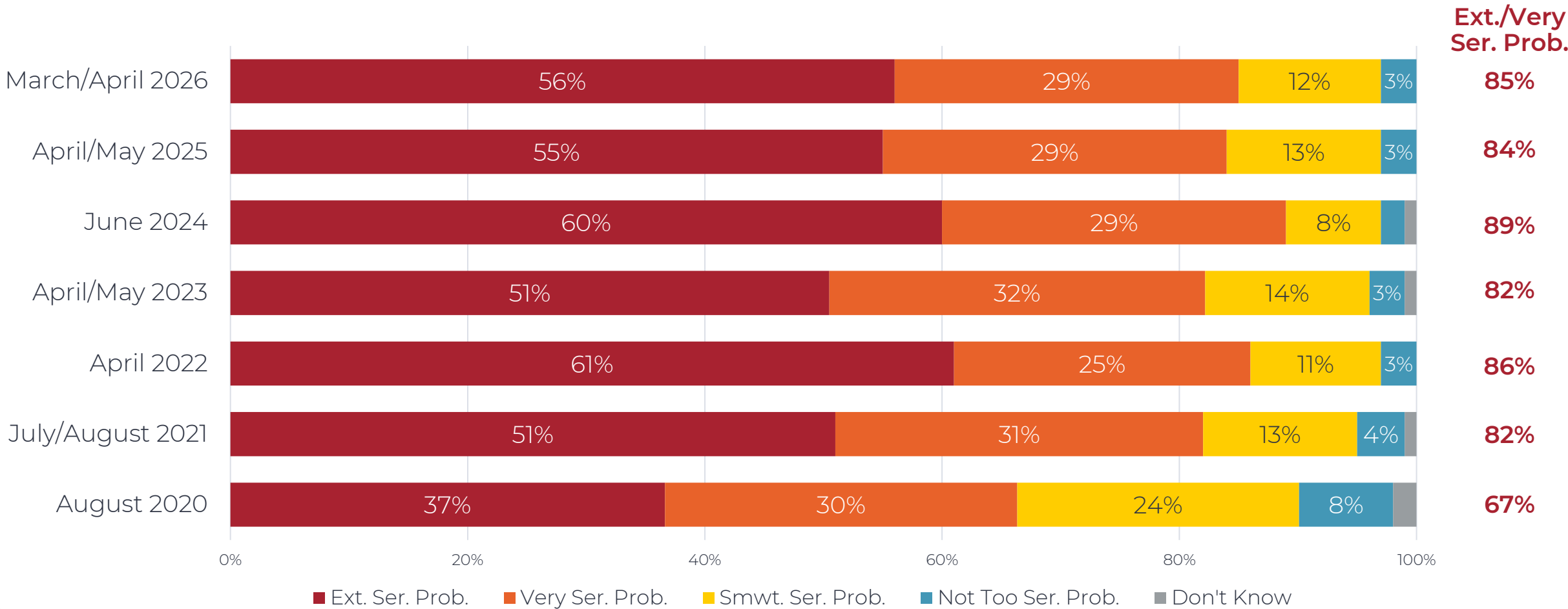

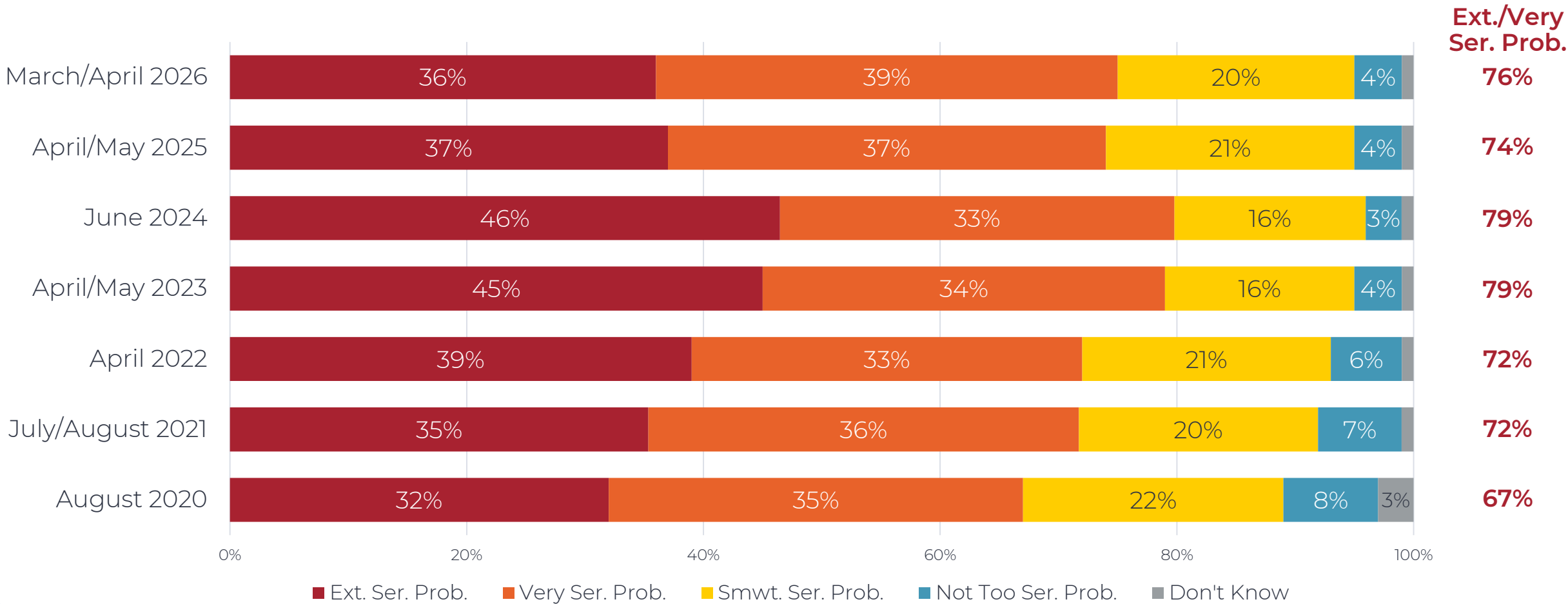

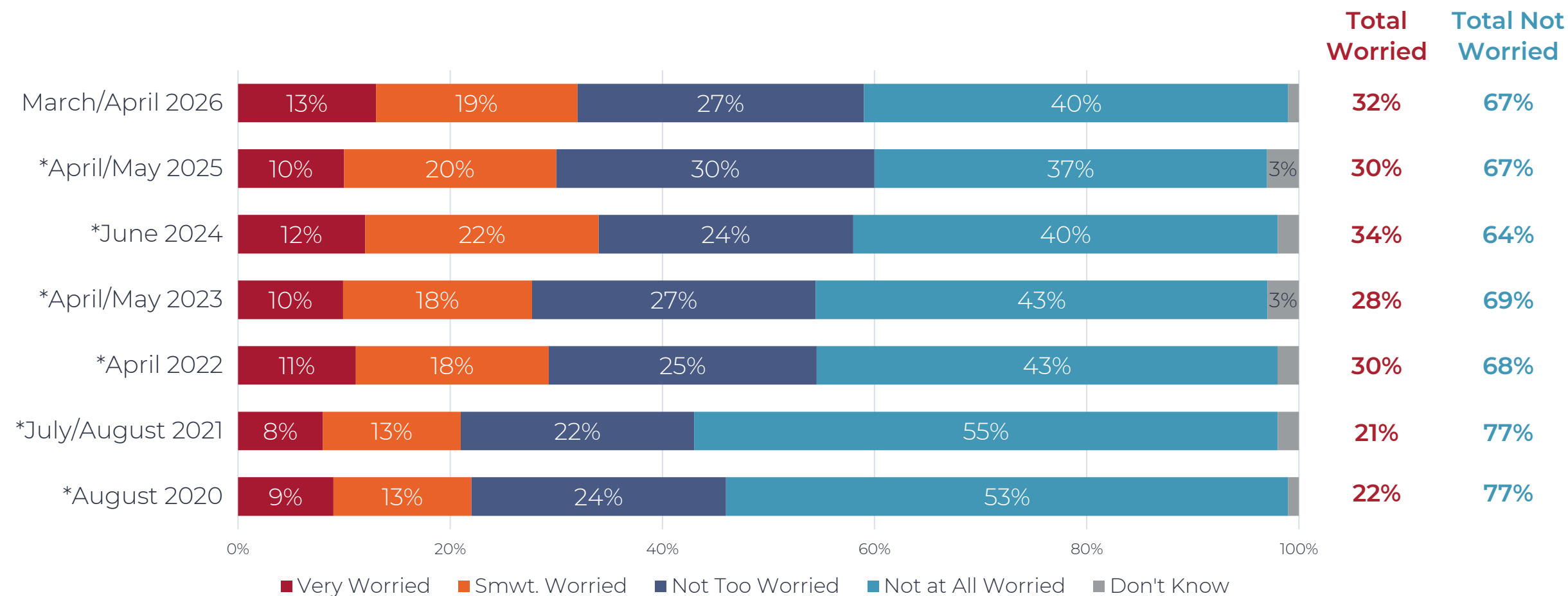

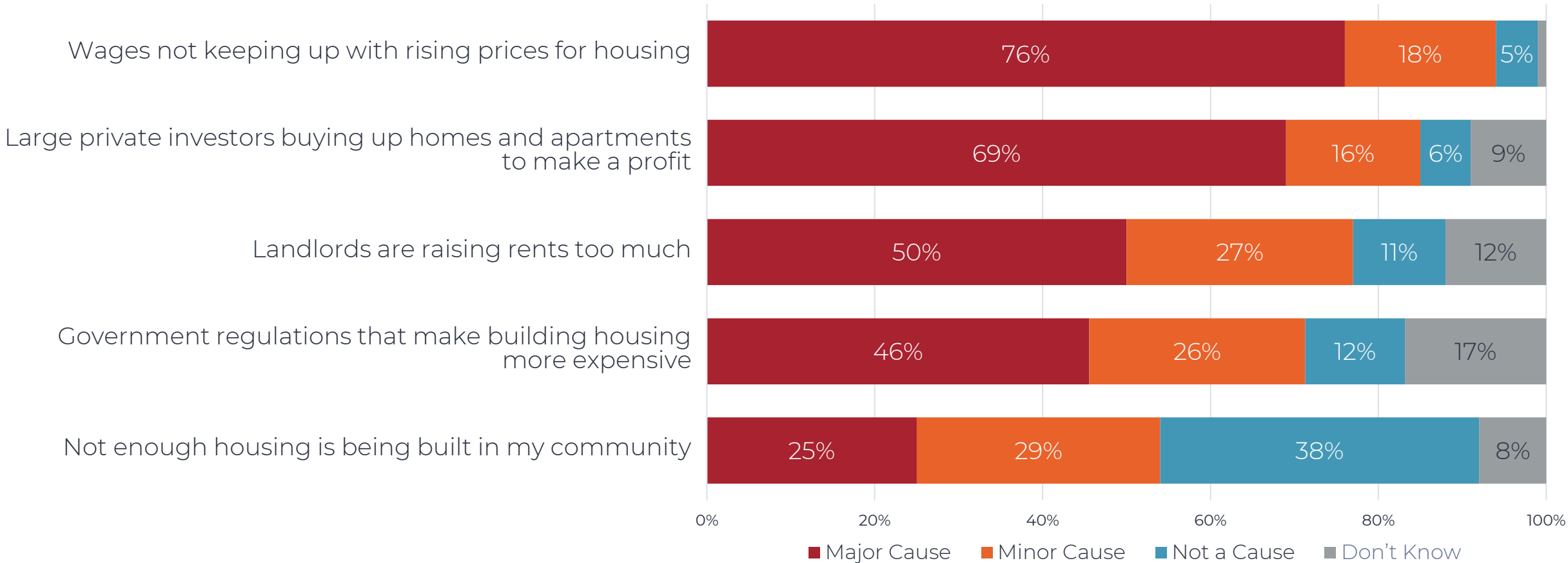

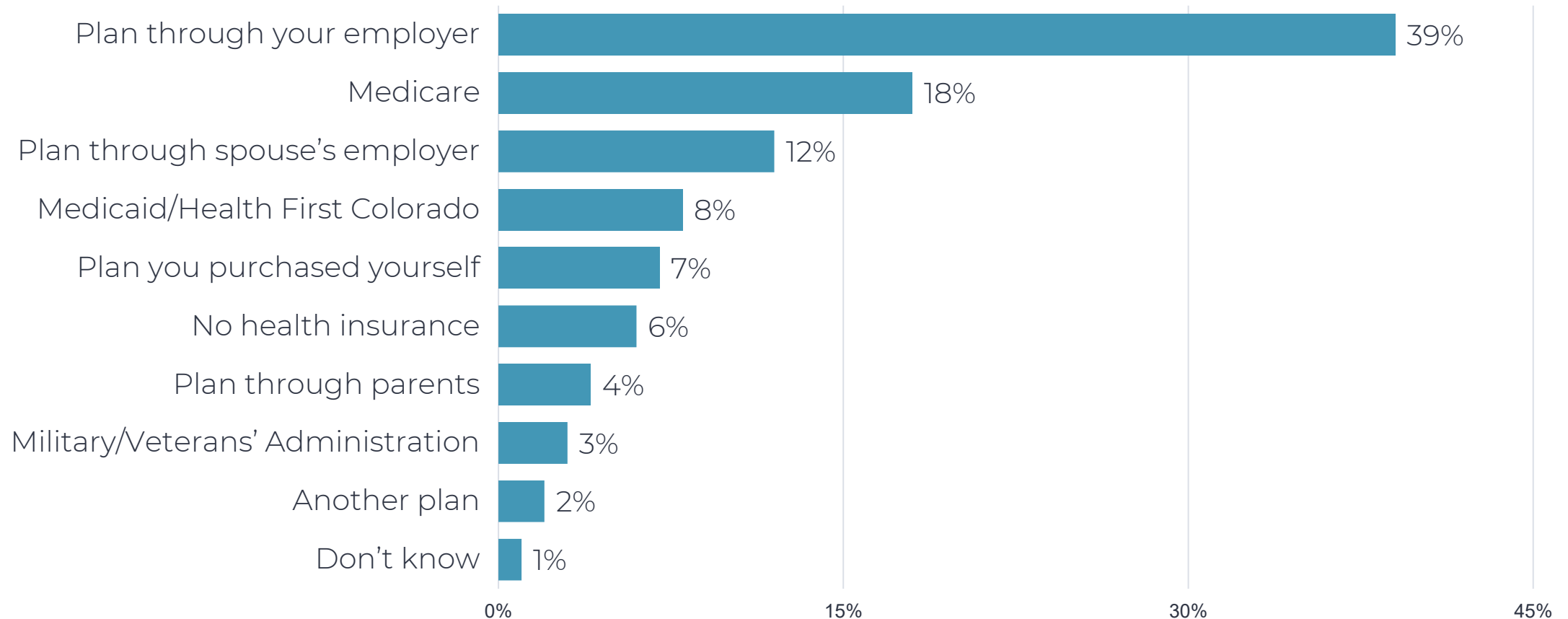

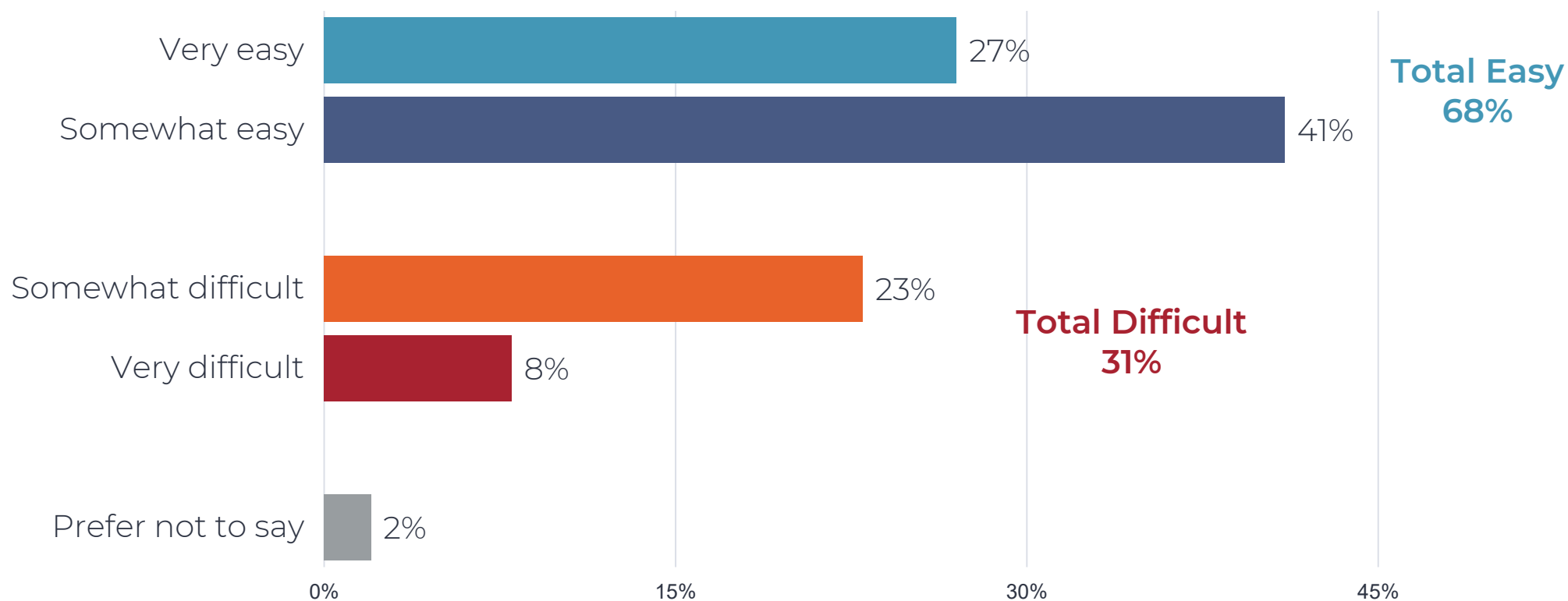

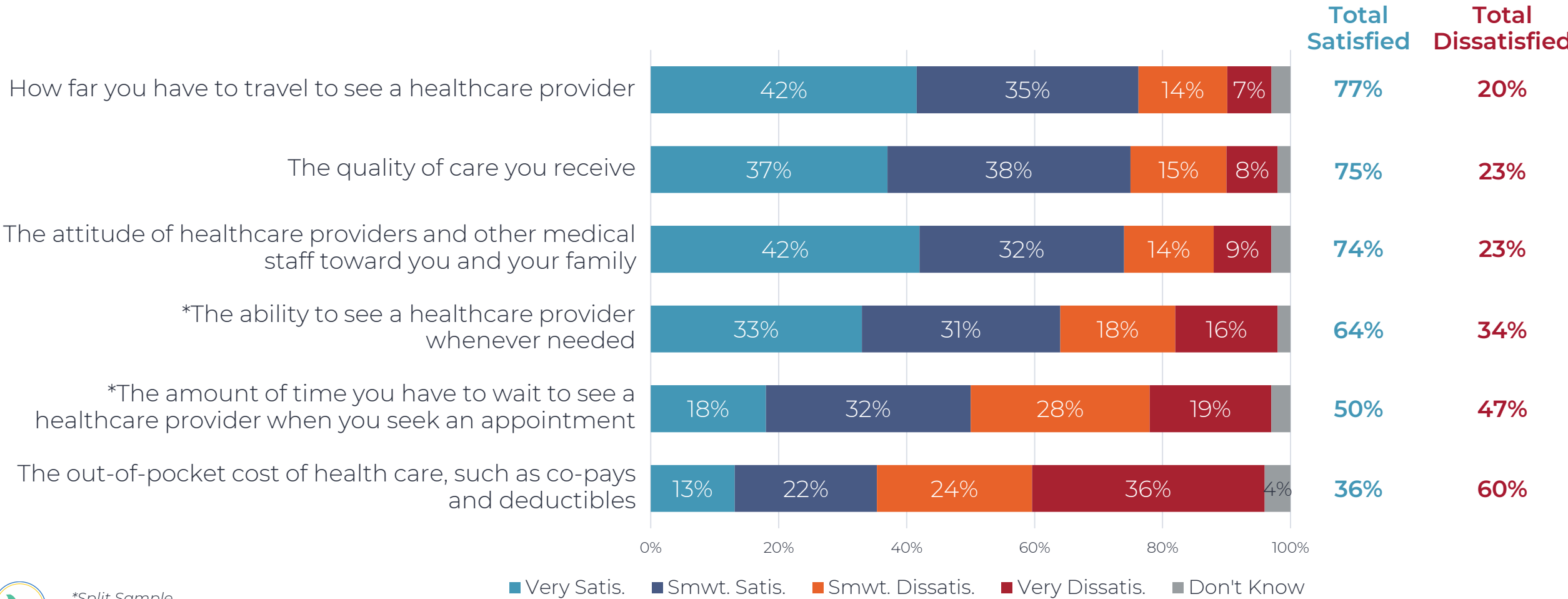

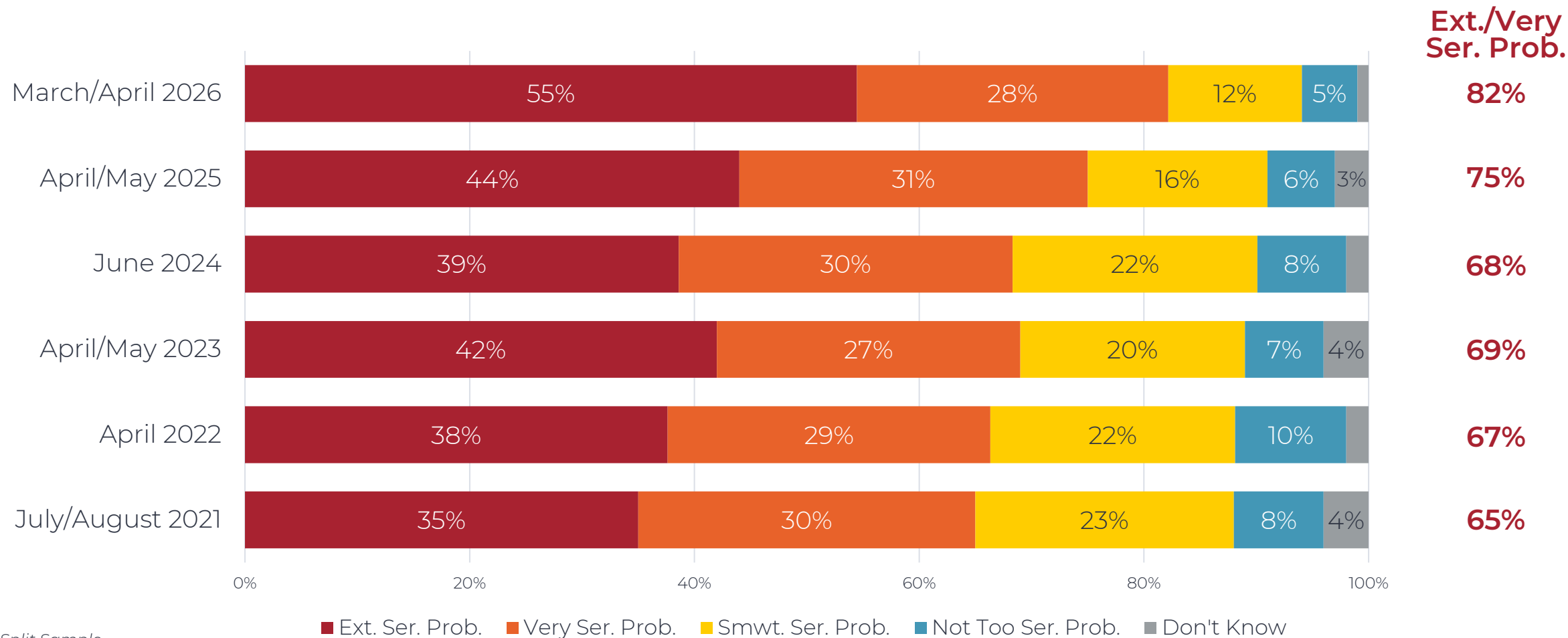

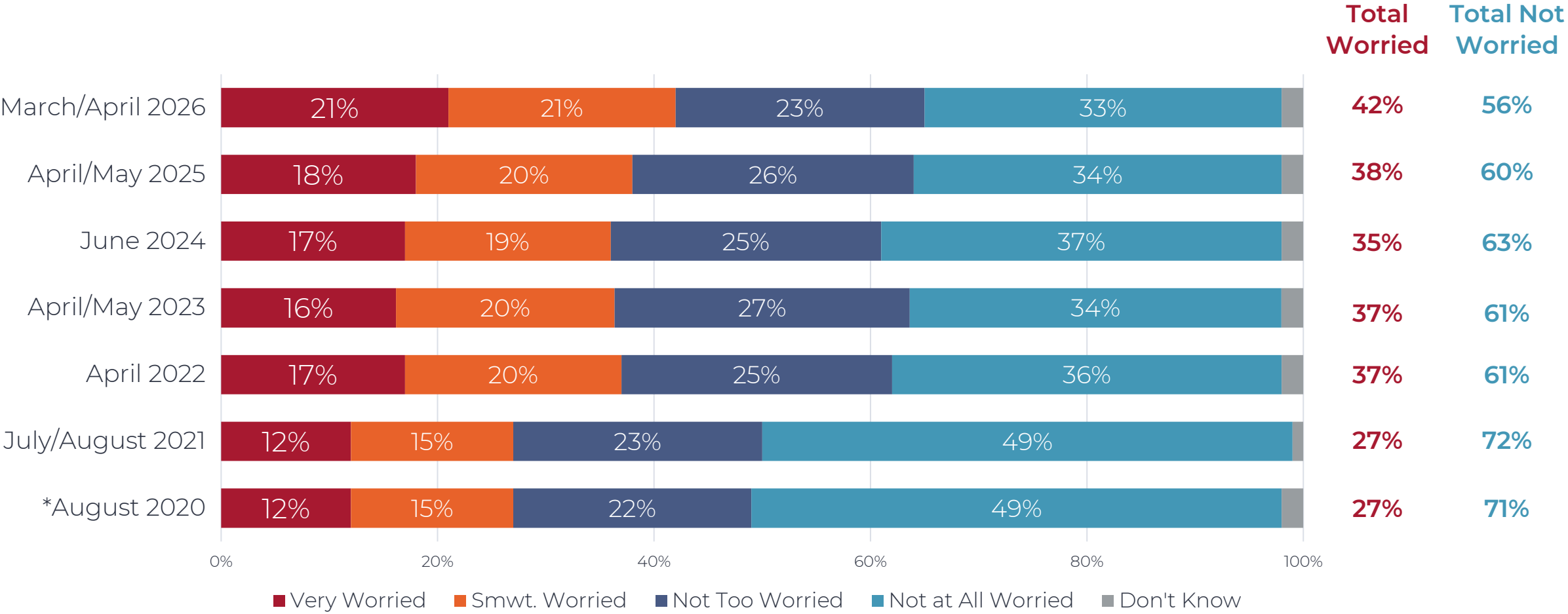

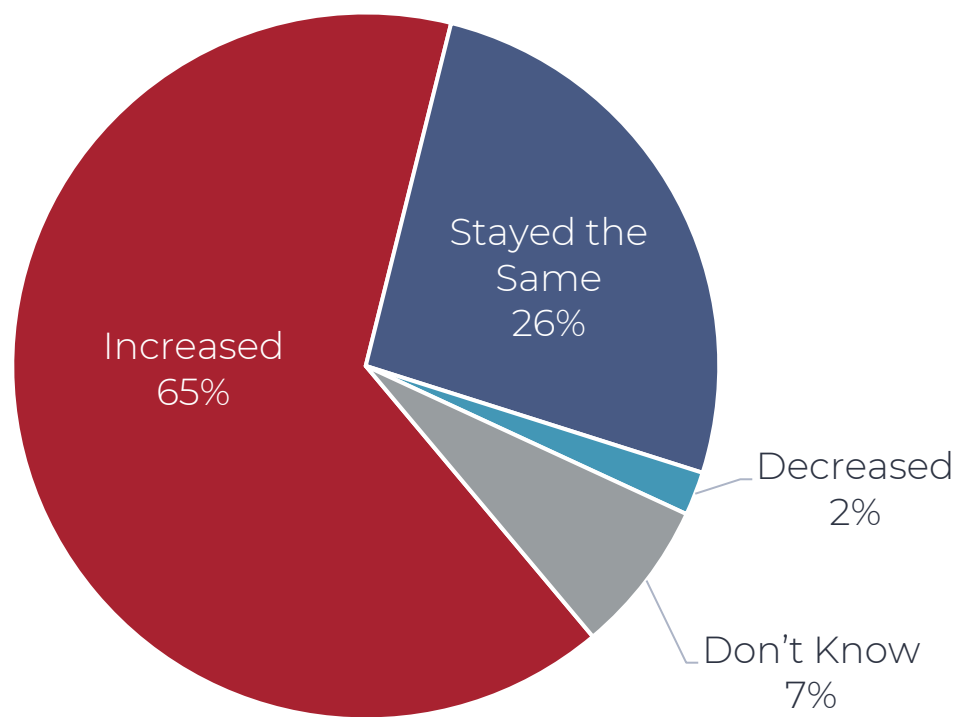

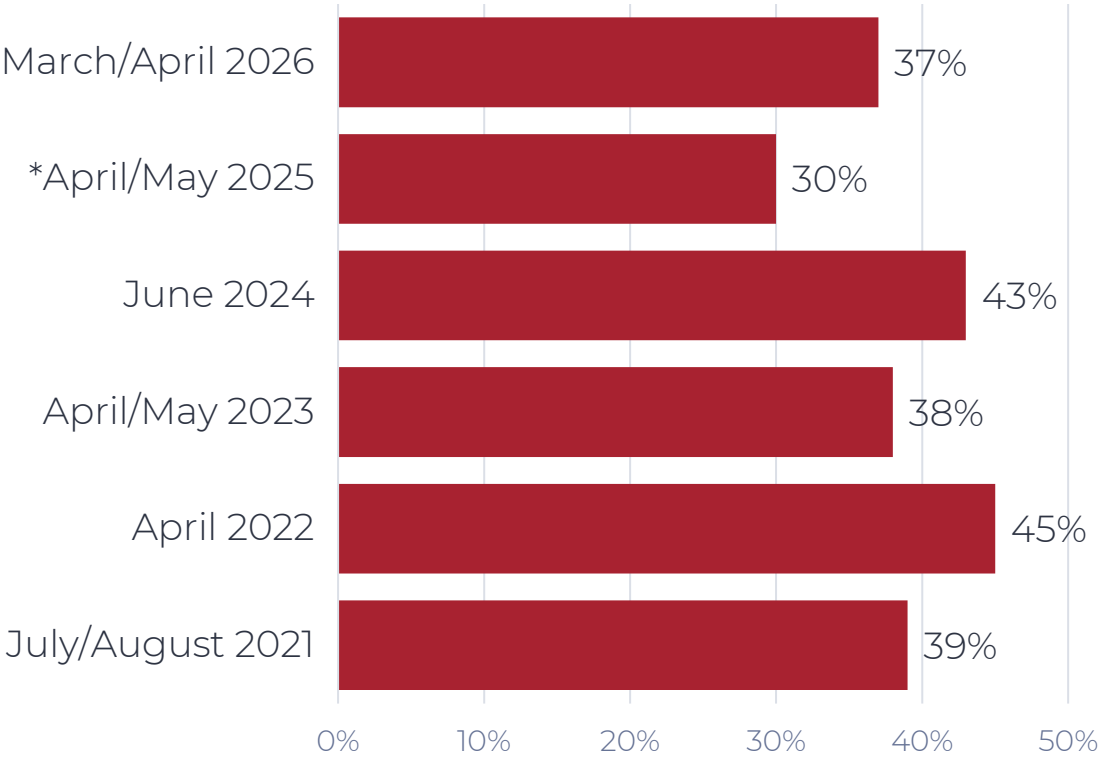

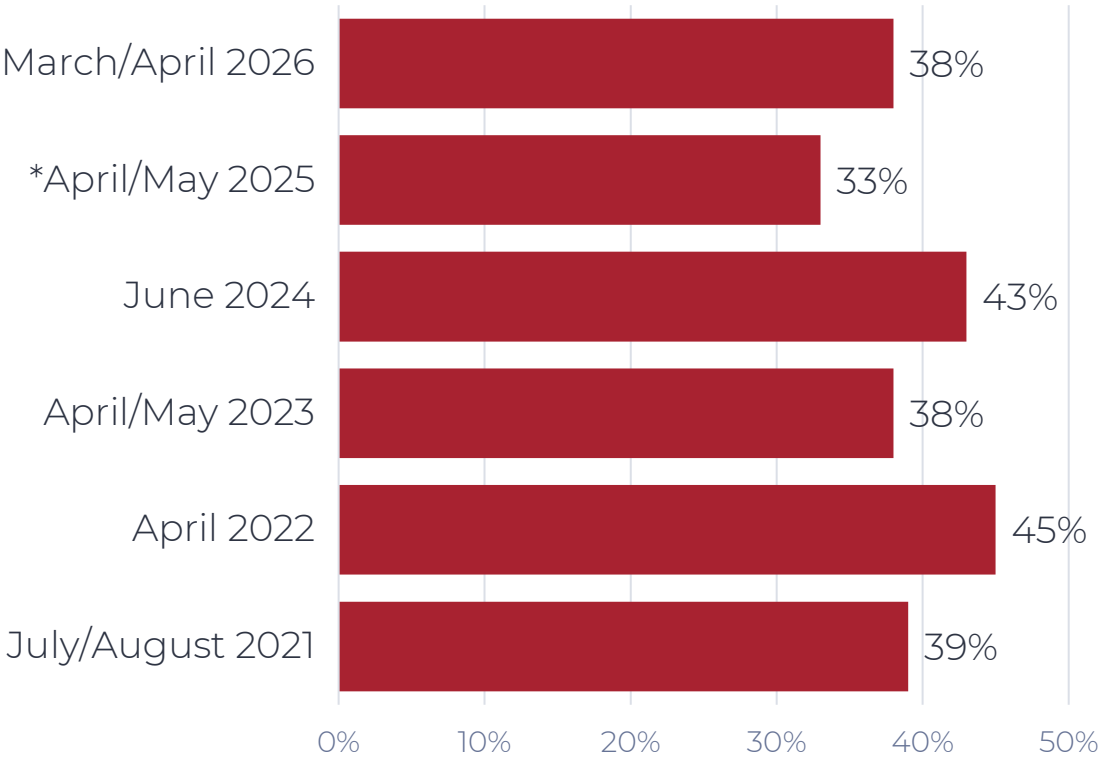

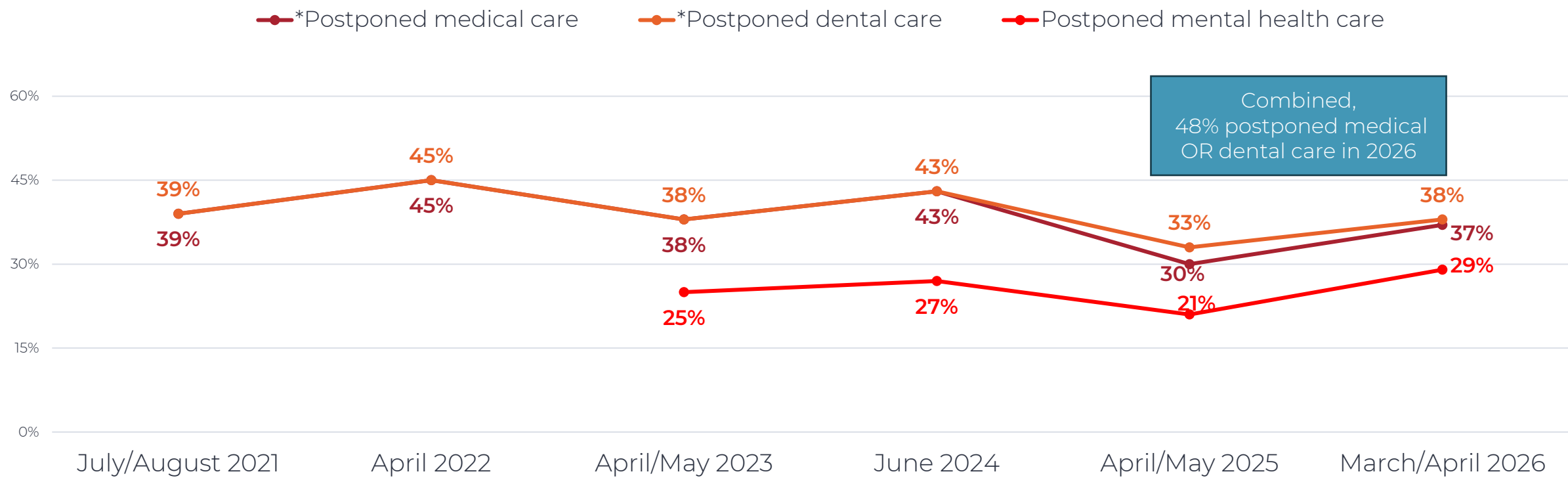

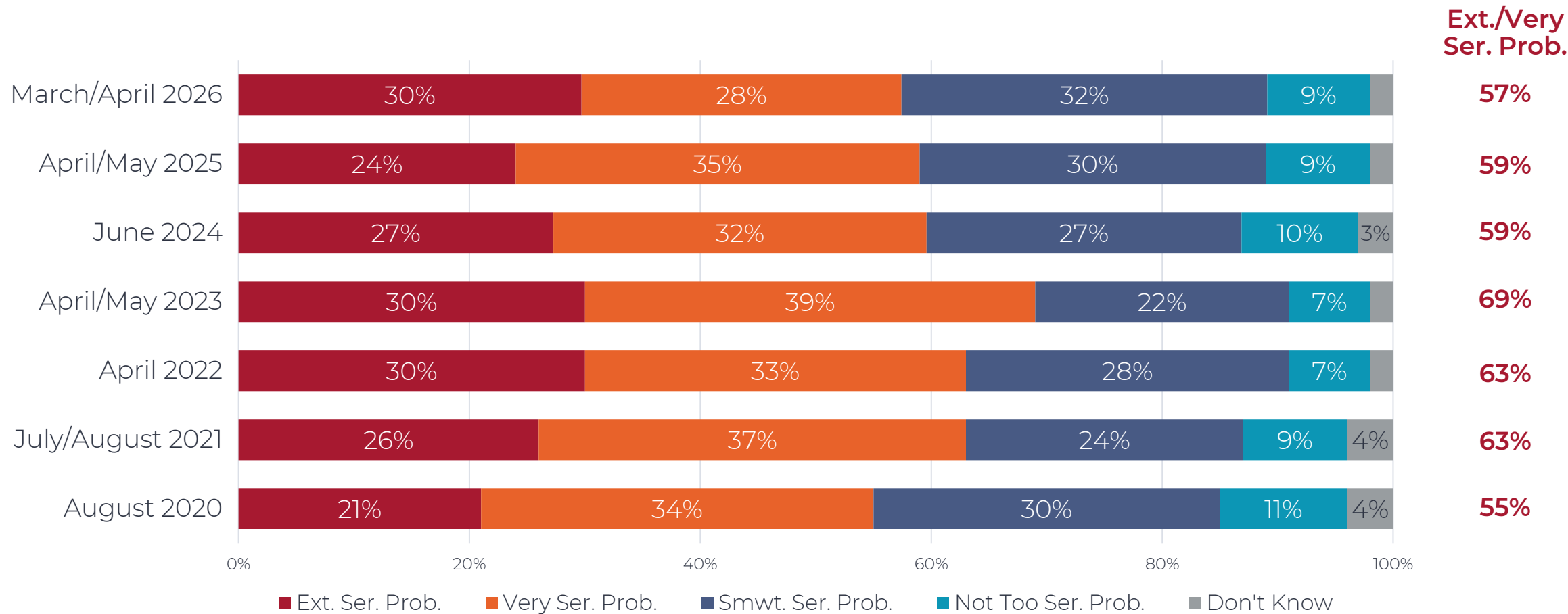

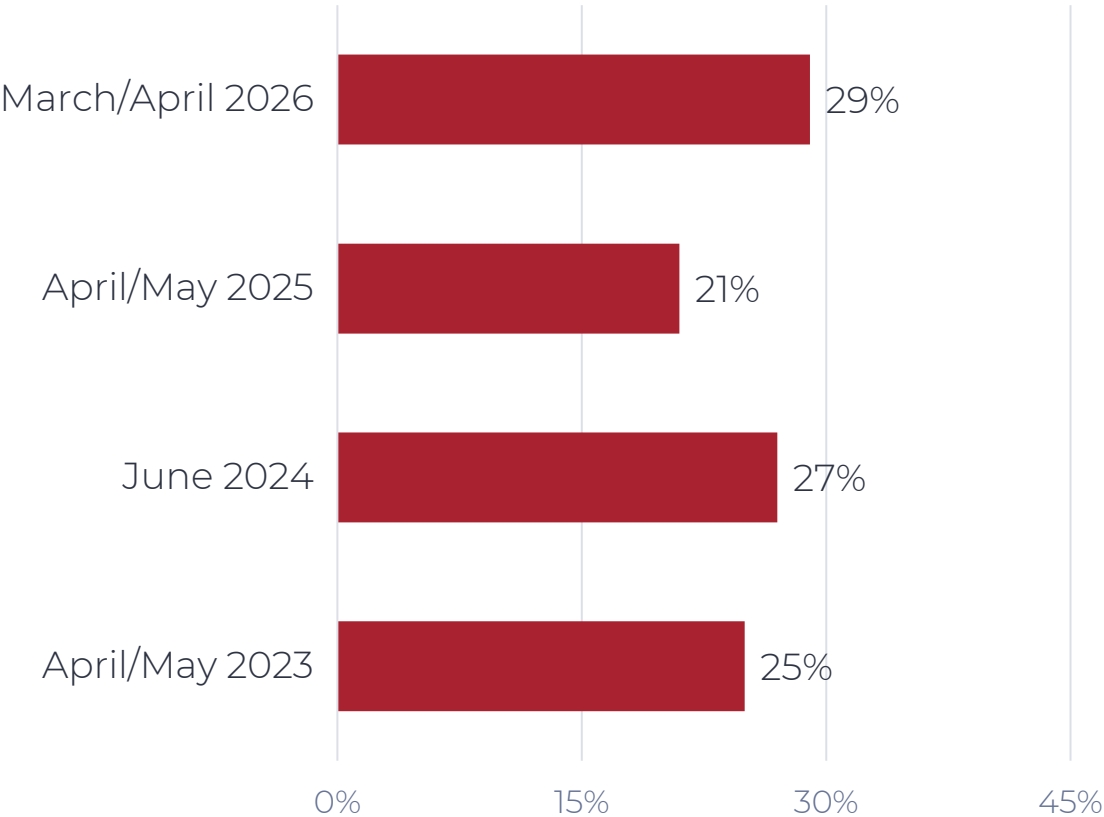

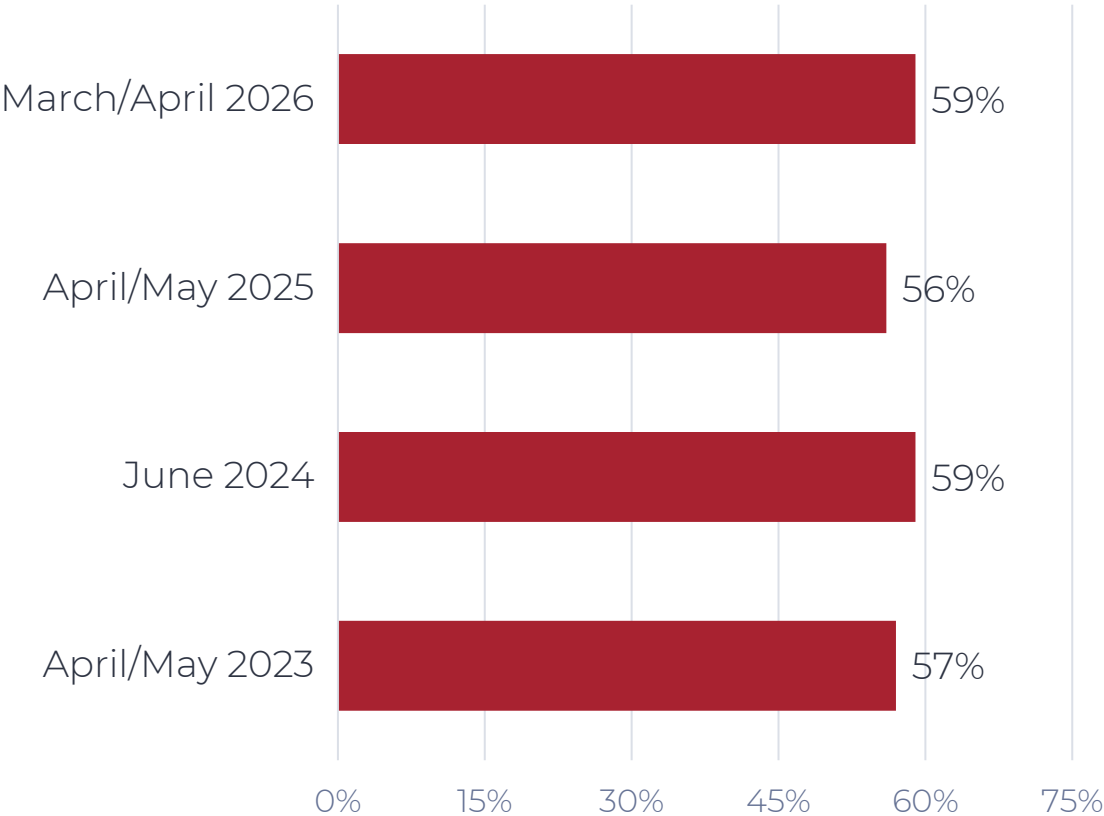

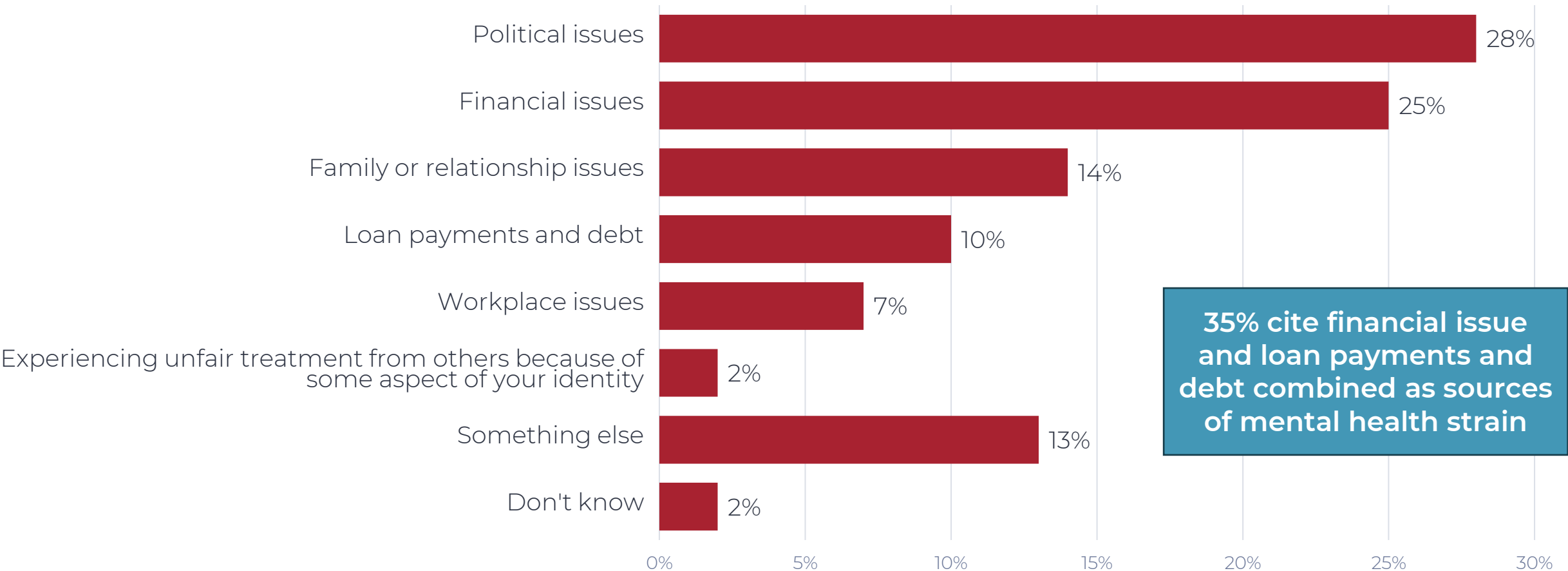
